Younkin family ancestor receives a new grave marker

In early May, members of the Great dants visited the gravesite over the Glades Chapter of the Sons of the past two centuries. In 2008, descen-American Revolution and other de-scendants of Johann Heinrich Junghen gathered at Keller's Lutheran Church Cemetery about 8 miles east of Perkasie, Bucks County, to place a new grave marker for Junghen.

Junghen is the forefather of many of the Younkin family members living in Somerset County today and was an American patriot. He was a German immigrant who died on his farm in the winter of 1787. He was 70 years old. At that time, a small sandstone marker was placed at his grave with his name and birth and death dates.

At the time of his death, Junghen had been in America for about 26 years. He owned a farm of 118 acres, which straddled Bedminster and Haycock townships in Bucks County, not far from the plantations owned by his brother Herman. As a mark of his loyalty to his new country, Junghen signed an oath of allegiance to the newly formed United States of America during the Revolutionary War.

Some 38 years after Heinrich Junghen's death, in 1825, his widow Catharina (Scherer) Youngken died and was buried in the same cemetery, about 50 yards away, with her inscription written in English.

As their adopted nation was plunged into Civil War, more than 140 of their direct descendants are known to have taken up arms. Many of their descendants married into the Minerd-Minard-Miner-Minor family.

The couple's offspring and descen-

dants Linda Marker (of the Frederick J. Younkin line) and Everett and Christine Sechler (of the Rev. Herman Younkin branch) paid their respects and captured images of the markers.

For cousin Everett Sechler, the experience was profound, but so too was his recognition of the deterioration of the stone marker. The stone was listing to one side and was heavily chipped in places. He envisioned a time when the lettering would vanish and with it the tangible evidence of the man's existence and his German heritage.

As treasurer of the Junghen-Younkin Reunion, Sechler inspired a team of cousin volunteers to take a bold step. At the 2018 reunion, attendees voted to proceed with installation of a second marker, to be placed beside the deteriorating stone. Arrangements were made, funding authorized, and on May 7 the new marker was installed by a group of 11 cousins who traveled from three states to be a part of the experience.

Sechler said it was the fulfillment of a duty that needed to be done for future generations of Younkin descen-dants. Sechler, of Confluence, and Randy Henry, of Girard, Ohio, are members of the Great Glades Chapter. Susan Moon, Linda Marker and Nancy Koontz are members of the Great Crossings Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.



Thomas E Silver Heaven opened the gates for Thomas E. Silver, 87, who died peacefully with family by his side at Wooster Community Hospital on July 4, 2019, as fireworks were about to get underway. It was a fitting



sunset for a man who loved his country, his family, and especially his dear wife, Evelyn, who lives on. Born in 1932 -- 105 years after Silver Acres was established just west of Wooster -- Tom took great pride in being part of the fifth generation to grow up in the same family farmhouse. He extended the legacy of hospitality established generations before by hosting hayrides and high school floats, Easter Egg hunts and large Thanksgiving gatherings. He opened each meal with a welcome and a prayer, giving thanks for the blessings of a free country and the opportunity to treasure each other's company. Tom graduated from Wooster High School in 1950 and attended the Mansfield branch of The Ohio State University. He was a member of the 555th Honors Detachment and was proud to help provide military honors as fellow veterans were laid to rest. A Rural Youth leader and a popular square dance caller, he was also known for his gift for dancing the polka and the waltz. Early in his career, he was a dairy farmer and a carpenter, and he continued to care for the farm and build things – mowing the sprawling lawn as recently as last Tuesday. In 1975, he started Silver Realty, located "there on the (Wooster) Square", which later became Silver/HER Realtors. He served his cherished community in various capacities -- as president of the Wooster Board of Realtors and was inducted into the Realtor Hall of Fame; as president of

the Wooster Noon Lions and Wooster Cemetery Board; as a member of the Wooster High School chain gang for 40+ years; and a lifelong member and leader at Oak Chapel United Methodist Church. He and his best high school buddies, dubbed the "Cabin Boys," still gathered annually. He was an avid preservationist, working with his late partner in crime, Harry Mykrantz, to save what is now Cornerstone Elementary. Tom and his beloved first wife, Donna Shellenberger Silver, mother of his four children, also attained the "Century House" designation of Silver Acres from the Wayne County Historical Society. He loved to snow ski, water ski and golf, and could still do a slow, perfect cartwheel well into his seventies. He shared that he once read that the true mark of character was how many trees a man planted in his lifetime; Tom planted hundreds of them.
